COLLEGE ACCREDITATION OVERSIGHT PANEL TO DECIDE ON MISCONDUCT COMPLAINT AFTER PRESIDENTIAL EXECUTIVE ORDER

East Tennessee Public Relations Industry Whistleblower Lodged DEI / Political Bias Complaint

Complaint to be Adjudicated July 28 by Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA)

July 9, 2025, Maryville, Tennessee – A formal complaint lodged against the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications (ACEJMC) – based on significant documentation that ACEJMC leaders could not mask their partisan political bias and diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) dogma from their academic accreditation duties – will be examined at the upcoming meeting of the Council for Higher Education Accreditation's (CHEA) Committee on Recognition on Monday, July 28, 2025.

CHEA and its associated accrediting bodies have <u>long insisted</u> they are "nonpartisan," yet this challenge to one of CHEA's own affiliated higher education accreditors proves otherwise, in vividly detailed documentation.

The 149-page complaint with nearly as many evidentiary exhibits was filed on March 8, 2025, by Tennessean Mary Beth West, a one-time national board member (2002-03) of the previously apolitical Public Relations Society of America (PRSA), which appoints numerous ACEJMC Council members. A New York-based trade association, PRSA began veering into far-left partisan advocacy upon President Trump's first inauguration in January 2017. Most recently, PRSA announced in February 2025 a policy to "double down on DEI," despite PRSA's thousands of members working as military and other government-employed communicators at local, state, and federal levels, including taxpayer-funded higher education faculty and administrators, who are obligated to comply with President Trump's Executive Order 14151 of January 20, 2025, "Ending Radical and Wasteful

Government DEI Programs and Preferencing."

Since PRSA's leftist turn in 2017, West has been a PR industry whistleblower. She has documented the blatantly public and often inappropriate manner in which the current ACEJMC President Del Galloway (a PRSA appointee) has promoted divisive concepts such as racial scapegoating and stereotyping, as well as partisan political animus on social media, in ACEJMC intra-Council memoranda, and in publicly discoverable emails.

West's expansive complaint to CHEA sheds light on <u>Galloway</u>'s unvarnished animosities and <u>tasteless humor</u> at President Donald Trump's and <u>Republicans</u>' expense, documented in multiple social

media posts (subject to deletion by Galloway but screenshot by West), ever since Galloway joined the ACEJMC in 2018. West's complaint delves into ACEJMC abuses of power in 2021-22 to downgrade the accreditation of the <u>University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill</u>'s renowned, <u>multi-Hearst National Championship</u> award-winning <u>Hussman School of Journalism and Media</u>, based solely on so-called DEI "noncompliance." West chronicled in her complaint how ACEJMC inflicted <u>serious reputational damage to UNC's brand</u> with the unmerited downgrade, stoking fears among <u>other high-performing universities</u> that their programs might be targeted next.

"Were it not for President Donald Trump's strong leadership in issuing his Executive Orders, including "Reforming Accreditation to Strengthen Higher Education" as was issued on April 23, there's not a question in my mind that my complaint to CHEA would have ended up in their 'circular file' without a witness," West said.

<u>Complaint Excerpt</u>: ACEJMC President Del Galloway ridiculed via X UNC-Chapel Hill administrators' choice in 2021 not to grant tenure to New York Times "1619 Project" creator Nikole Hannah-Jones.

On May 21, 2021, Galloway posted on X, "Wrong. Wrong. Wrong.", along with a link to a Washington Post story on the UNC tenure decision involving Hannah-Jones, even though it was already documented on ACEJMC's calendar that UNC-Chapel Hill was due for reaccreditation review that year, requiring all accreditors like Galloway to maintain objectivity and to avoid obvious appearances of bias.

Two months after <u>Galloway's post on X</u> openly chastising UNC-Chapel Hill and exposing DEI-related animus against the university, Galloway himself purposely volunteered on July 19, 2021, to serve on the site-review team slated to evaluate UNC's Hussman School for reaccreditation. Publicly discoverable e-mails reveal that, upon his being invited to join the UNC site review team, Galloway did not self-disclose his own recent anti-UNC tweet from two months prior or recuse himself, as required by ACEJMC and CHEA "conflict of interest" policy and biasprevention rules.



"E.O. No. 14279 and Secretary McMahon give me such renewed hope that the accreditation racket – with the kinds of mafia-like tactics as I've copiously documented by ACEJMC officials in my complaint to CHEA – may end," West said. "Going forward, I can now hope that my own daughters' generation may experience a renewed focus on a top-notch higher education outcome, in an environment welcoming ideological diversity and freedoms of robust, open inquiry, without fear or favor. I wish the same for those in my industry and for America's future journalism, public relations, advertising, and digital media workforce."

West applauds the U.S. House Committee on Education & Workforce legislative effort to codify the Accreditation Presidential Executive Order and looks forward to a similar leadership initiative led by **Senator Tommy Tuberville** (R-AL), Chairman of the Education and the American Family Subcommittee of the Health, Education, Labor & Pensions Committee.

Before the Independence Day recess **H.R. 2516,** Accreditation for College Excellence (ACE) Act of 2025 (https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/house-bill/2516/text) introduced by Chairman of the Higher Education and Workforce Development Subcommittee **Congressman Burgess Owens** (R-UT), passed out of committee. The ACE Act stops accreditors from using partisan political biases such as those driving DEI as a quality standard for institutions. The legislation aims to re-focus accreditors on producing workforce-ready, critically thinking graduates – not force-feeding prescriptive, partisan ideology into societal institutions.

H.R. 4054, Accreditation Choice and Innovation Act: https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/house-bill/4054/text -- sponsored by Rep. Randy Fine (R-FL) — requires accreditors to use measurable student-success outcomes, provides an on-ramp for capable new accreditors, and streamlines the accreditation process. Both bills await scheduling for full House floor consideration.
